2020 RCCOMPLISHMENTS

- Volunteer West Virginia programming reached all 55 counties.

BE HIND Covid-19

To promote volunteerism during COVID-19, Volunteer West Virginia started the Be Kind, COVID-19 campaign. As part of the project, Volunteer West Virginia provided mini-grants to local organizations to host COVID-19 related volunteer projects. The goal of the campaign was to safely engage volunteers and promote kindness throughout the state.

The response to the mini-grant program was overwhelming. In total, Volunteer West Virginia granted \$14,000 to host 44 volunteer projects.





Volunteers with the Brooke Hancock Family Resource Network deliver thinking-of-you cards for residents living in nursing facilities in Brooke and Hancock counties and thank you cards for the staff of these facilities. The project reached over 500 residents and staff.



Volunteers team up to assemble masks and safety gear for children in foster care with CASA For Kids of Monongalia and Preston Counties. The children were so excited to receive their kits, and as quickly as they could, they were trying on their masks. One child even said, "This mask is my favorite color!"



Volunteers with Faith in Action deliver Porch Packages to seniors in the Kanawha Valley to check in on them during COVID-19 and to remind them they are loved. The Porch Packages have been well received by recipients and volunteers.



COVID-19 impacted drug treatment facilities in significant ways. Recovery staff were placed under great stress as relapses rose and facilities self-isolated. To thank these staff, volunteers from Hope Recovery Manor write kind notes and deliver them to recovery agencies throughout Parkersburg.



To spread kindness during COVID-19, the Hinton Historic Landmarks Commission hosts a community litter cleanup and wellness day.



Bryant Anderson, A Lifebridge AmeriCorps member, tries out a new hand sanitizing station at Catholic Charities Neighborhood Center in Wheeling. Members of the community are now able to wash their hands before meals and after they pick up food pantry boxes.



Natasha Albino decorates birthday posters for residents in Clarksburg-Harrison Regional Housing Authority's senior living facilities so they feel recognized and loved during COVID-19.



As the rates of COVID-19 rose in their community, Sherri James and Florence Cox helped deliver 100 "Homeless Helper Bags" in the Clarksburg area. Bags included face masks, hand sanitizer, a pair of warm gloves, socks, Chapstick, a toothbrush, and hand warmers. The project was started by Kelly Miller Community Center, a program of the West Virginia Black Heritage Festival.



Students learn how to sew masks at the Playmates Child Development Center in Huntington. They donated the masks to a local Blessing Box in honor of their "Keep Calm and Mask On!" project. Within minutes, all the masks were gone!

Scouts with Boy Scouts of America Troop 152 pack notecard kits for volunteers to send handwritten cards to nursing homes. Through their careful organization volunteers were able to send 500 cards to seniors throughout northcentral West Virginia.



AmeriCorps: Continuing to Serve During a Pandemic

When schools first closed for the COVID-19 pandemic, I couldn't even begin to understand how I, as an AmeriCorps mentor, could reach out and help our students effectively. This sounded very far-fetched and even impossible.

When I returned to school, I decided to take it one step at a time. I started going on food deliveries with the school staff. Along the bus routes, I started interacting with my students. The first question they would ask was, "How am I going to get help?", or they would ask if they could call me. I realized I did not need a big plan to help, I just needed to let them know I was still there.

Over the next few days, we started contacting as many students as we could. I woke up the next morning to several messages from students. Seeing the overwhelming response made us realize the impact we could still have on their lives.

During this time, we learned that two students lost their dad to a drug overdose. We were able to connect with them over FaceTime to see how we could help. Although they initially denied needing help, they later reached out about groceries. I was able to get groceries and drop them off in front of their house and set up a way for them to receive the food and supplies they would need to get through this.

I am thankful that students could reach out to us and that we were able to help. Being at home is sometimes the worst thing for kids who live in undesirable situations. My hope is that knowing we're here for them will help in some small way.


Volunteer Generation Fund

Volunteer West Virginia supports volunteer programs in the state by providing grant funding through the Volunteer Generation Fund (VGF). Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, VGF grantees found innovative ways to engage volunteers by starting letter writing campaigns, collecting donations for care packages, and building Blessing Boxes.



COVID-19 Volunteer Trend: Blessing Boxes

The most challenging times inspire the most creative solutions! During the COVID-19 pandemic, Community Connections, Inc., a Volunteer Generation Fund grantee, came up with a simple, yet effective idea to meet the need of food security across Mercer County.





Through the generosity of volunteers, faith-based organizations, civic groups, collegiate groups, first responders, law enforcement, and local leaders, Community Connections keep the boxes stocked with food products. Many volunteers and nonprofit took note of this creative project and now Blessing Boxes can be found throughout the state!









Community Emergency Response Teams

Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT) played an important role in West Virginia's response to COVID-19. The program trains volunteers in basic disaster response skills, such as first aid, search and rescue, and disaster preparedness. Here are some of the many ways CERT volunteers helped West Virginians in 2020.

- Clay County CERT In partnership with local response agencies, Clay CERT
 volunteers help to set up and assist with a Senior Citizen helpline and weekly check
 ins, local Red Cross Blood Drives, distribution of COVID information and sanitizers,
 and the set-up of a WV Mask Army Hub, which has produced over 1,000 masks for
 first responders and public health officials.
- Hardy County CERT In partnership with the ministerial association and other volunteers, Hardy County CERT members serve as "Grocery Gofers." They pick up and deliver groceries to homebound residents in the Moorefield area.
- Beckley CERT The Beckley CERT program has partnered with the American Red Cross to assist with several local blood drives. CERT members help with registration, take temperatures, work the canteen, and sanitize the rooms. They also assist the Raleigh County Health Department's COVID testing sites by conducting traffic and handling intake forms.
- Mid-Ohio Valley Health Dept. (CERT) Mid-Ohio Valley Regional CERT volunteers support the health department with COVID-19 safety measures. CERT volunteers conduct daily temperature checks for all staff and clients coming into the facility. They assist with intakes at COVID-19 drive thru testing sites in Parkersburg and conduct temperature checks for homeless clients who visit the Salvation Army for meals.
