



VOLUNTEER RECOGNITION MINI GRANTS

To thank volunteers who have continued to serve during COVID-19, Volunteer West Virginia developed a Volunteer Recognition Mini Grant program. Organizations were eligible to receive up to \$500 to host a volunteer recognition project. The response to the mini grant program was overwhelming. In total, Volunteer West Virginia granted \$25,575 to host 62 volunteer recognition projects throughout the state. Over 3,600 volunteers were recognized through this project.



AMERICORPS MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

Mindy Robinson, LifeBridge AmeriCorps

"How can I help?" This question has shaped Mindy Robinson's life since she was a child. It's something she asks herself several times a day. It's how she ended up in AmeriCorps.

Mindy grew up one of five children in Buckhannon. She was a child of divorce, and her mom worked mostly under the table jobs, living on very little. She found that growing up in poverty made her empathetic and willing to help those in need.

As a fifteen-year-old high school student, Mindy joined the Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership (HOBY) program. The flame ignited in her by HOBY still burns strong, so when Mindy's ex mother-in-law showed up at her house to pick up her grandkids with a proposition for Mindy to join AmeriCorps, she knew she had to pursue it. What she didn't know was how much it would change her life.

Mindy interviewed with LifeBridge AmeriCorps and was selected to serve; the rest is history, and she wouldn't trade it for the world. Mindy serves as the Financial Literacy Coordinator at Central West Virginia Community Action in Clarksburg. The mission of her program is to provide financial independence for all families as a stepping stone away from poverty.

Mindy spends the majority of her time preparing tax returns and doing intakes for those in the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program. The rest of the year she presents workshops and classes on financial literacy, including budgeting and couponing.

As she completes her fourth year of AmeriCorps service, Mindy knows AmeriCorps has guided her to where she is. In December, Mindy will be graduating from Marshall University with a Bachelor's Degree in Sociology and Psychology. She recently purchased her first home, which just so happens to be right across the street from her twin sister.

Wherever the future takes her, Mindy knows AmeriCorps has changed her life and she plans to continue to serve her community. She urges you to ask: How can I help? Maybe you will end up igniting a flame of your own.

Kaitlyn Deskins, Appalachian Forest National Heritage Area

Endings are often not what we expect – graduations, retirement, the end of your favorite show. These endings are supposed to be joyful, but often they just beg the question, what happens next? This is the position Kaitlyn Deskins found herself in one year ago after graduating college with a degree in Geology from the University of Southern Indiana.

Kaitlyn grew up on 13 acres of land in Indiana. She was an only child living with her mom, dad, and a bunch of cats and dogs. During Kaitlyn's senior year of high school, her mom was diagnosed with stage four ovarian cancer. Despite the adversity of her senior year, Kaitlyn carried on and attended college as a first-generation student.

Four years later it was 2020, her mom was cancer free, and Kaitlyn had a college degree in Geology, and she didn't know what was going to come next. She and her friends applied for various entry-level positions. She struggled to find something she wanted to commit to. When she found AmeriCorps, it felt like the right place for her to be, so she applied.

Kaitlyn received an AmeriCorps position with the Appalachian Forest National Heritage Area (AFHNA) and was placed at the West Virginia Division of Forestry in Elkins. Throughout her service, Kaitlyn helped to build trails, lead tours, and teach adults and children about West Virginia's forests.

While attending a meeting as an AmeriCorps member, she met a professor from West Virginia University. He shared an opportunity with her: a graduate research position. Through the program Kaitlyn could receive a stipend and a scholarship to earn a Master's Degree in Forestry. Not one to say no, Kaitlyn jumped at the opportunity. In the fall, she moved to Morgantown to pursue a Master's Degree; an opportunity she would have never known about had she not joined AmeriCorps.

During her time here, Kaitlyn has grown to love West Virginia. After she gets her degree, she hopes to stay in West Virginia and work for the West Virginia Division of Forestry.

Endings are hard. But they are how we grow, learn, and find our passions. Kaitlyn is an example of how following your gut can turn an ending into a new beginning and even provide an opportunity to lend a hand along the way.







DISASTER SERVICES

How We Help:

- Support Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT).
- Promote disaster preparedness through Ready WV.
- Mobilize AmeriCorps members to help respond to disasters.
- Partner with response agencies to engage volunteers in disaster response and recovery.









As communities started to reopen from COVID-19, local emergency preparedness outreach begins to resume. Volunteer West Virginia provides Ready WV preparedness materials to local emergency response and volunteer organizations to help with these efforts.



AmeriCorps NCCC teams Delta 1 and River 5 deploy from Mississippi to help with COVID-19 vaccination clinics in West Virginia. They assisted over 21,000 vaccination clients, providing 2,800 volunteer hours.







COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAMS

The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Program trains volunteers in basic disaster response skills, such as first aid, search and rescue, and disaster preparedness.

In 2021 CERT Volunteers

- Invested over 3,500 hours in their communities participating in emergency preparedness trainings, drills, outreach, and disaster response.
- Served 2,064 hours responding to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Helped to vaccinate and test over 135,000 people for COVID-19.
- Supported several local blood drives, assisting with sanitization, the canteen, and patient monitoring.
- Responded to local weather-related events.


