



SEPTEMBER 11TH NATIONAL DAY OF SERVICE AND REMEMBRANCE GRANTS

In 2025, Volunteer West Virginia awarded nine grants for the September 11th National Day of Service and Remembrance, totaling \$89,610. This funding was used for the development of large volunteer projects that served a community need.

More than 1,000 volunteers came together across West Virginia to make a difference in their communities through a wide range of service projects, including:

Providing home repairs in low-income neighborhoods of South Wheeling following severe flooding.

Assembling and delivering food and hygiene backpacks to individuals and families in need in Monongalia and Preston Counties.

Leading community clean-up and beautification efforts in Tucker County.

Providing outdoor education and nature experiences for middle school students in Monroe County. Assembling and delivering backpacks filled with hygiene and health care items for Veterans in the greater Huntington area.



Completing a Veterans memorial honoring local service members in Clay County.



Building wheelchair ramps and improving home accessibility for residents in the greater Parkersburg area.

Distributing food boxes to families and individuals in need throughout the Eastern Panhandle.

Enhancing community walking trails to expand outdoor recreation opportunities at West Liberty University.





University Physicians & Surgeons at Marshall University recruited more than 350 volunteers to assemble and deliver care packages and resources to over 400 Veterans. Volunteers connected Veterans to essential services, shared much-needed supplies, and spent time listening to their stories - creating meaningful connections while honoring their service.

GRANT HIGHLIGHTS

Community Markets Inc., located in Shepherdstown, brought together 54 volunteers for a 9/11 Day of Service Food Box Giveaway, distributing 350 bags of local food that impacted more than 1,100 individuals - the largest number of people the organization has ever served in a single day! Volunteers also delivered food to homebound residents for the first time, ensuring no one was left out of this remarkable day of service.





West Liberty University enlisted 45 volunteers for a Day of Service focused on improving campus hiking trails. Participants cleared debris, assembled benches and picnic tables, and marked trails - connecting students across campus while creating spaces for recreation, education, and community pride.

Friends of Monroe, Inc. engaged nearly 200 volunteers in a 9/11 Day of Service focused on conservation and outdoor educational experiences for middle school students. Activities included guided hikes, citizen science training, and wildlife presentations, strengthening community connections and inspiring environmental stewardship across generations.

In 2025, Volunteer West Virginia's ReadyWV program supported agencies statewide in sharing disaster preparedness information. By partnering with county offices of emergency management, local health and safety organizations, and AmeriCorps Seniors, who offered specialized training for older adults, the program helped communities of all ages develop the skills and confidence needed to prepare for emergencies.

materials with new pet
adopters.

Volunteer West Virginia sponsored a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training at Camp Dawson for Civil Air Patrol members, equipping volunteers with the skills to assist communities during disasters.

COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAMS

The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Program trains volunteers in basic disaster response skills, such as first aid, search and rescue, and disaster preparedness. CERT volunteers support their communities in a variety of ways.
